ACLU of Idaho Immigration Attitudes Tracking Study

Methodology

Opinions of Treasure Valley and Magic Valley residents were collected.

- + Responses were collected digitally.
- + 462 complete responses were collected.
- + The survey was in field September 15th through October 1st, 2025.
- + The survey results have a margin of error of $\pm 4.6\%$ at the 95% confidence level.
- + Demographic qualifiers:
 - + Treasure Valley and Magic Valley residents
 - + 18+
 - + Minimum quota of 125 Treasure Valley residents
 - + Minimum quota of 125 Magic Valley residents
 - + Minimum quota of 50 Latine respondents

Key Learnings

Public attitudes toward immigrants in Idaho's Treasure and Magic Valleys have grown more positive across numerous metrics since the 2024 baseline study.

- + Public sentiment toward immigrants improved across the Treasure and Magic Valleys, but favorability still depends on how immigrants are described.
 - + Overall favorability increased to 59%, up from 46% in 2024, with gains across all political affiliations.
 - + Favorability toward Latin American immigrants climbed from 37% to 56%, while unfavorable views dropped sharply from 23% to 14%.
 - + Views of undocumented immigrants is polarized: 25% favorable, 50% unfavorable.
- + Most (64%) support E-Verify, while 55% oppose deploying the National Guard and 60% say enforcement should not occur in schools, churches, or hospitals.
- + Respondents show strong, consistent support for inclusive immigration policies.
 - + 81% support creating pathways to legal status for immigrants who meet work and residency requirements.
 - + 76% support creating pathways to legal status for DREAMers.
- + 64% believe deportation should apply only to serious crimes. Just over half support limiting housing (51%) and public assistance (54%) for undocumented immigrants, but few back restricting work or education.
- + Support for restricting immigration in Idaho dropped from 39%→34%, while belief that the state should invest more in helping immigrants grew from 42%→52%.
- + The “We Are Idaho” campaign performed strongly: 23% recalled seeing the video (mostly on social media), and 67% reacted favorably overall, including a 52% positive response among WMR.




Respondents are balanced across age and gender.

Most respondents are White, and have lived in Idaho 20+ years.


Age




Gender



Idaho Residency





Race or Ethnicity



Survey Demographics

Partisan balance remained steady, though 2025 shows a slight leftward shift, still within the margin of error.

Strong Democrats increased from 8% to 12%. Moderate Republicans rose slightly from 20% to 24%, while Strong Republicans fell from 16% to 13%.

Q28: Please use the slider to select where you fall on the political spectrum with 0 being very liberal and 100 being very conservative.





Attitudes Towards Immigrants



Attitudes Towards Immigration

Favorability toward immigrants overall increased by **13 points** in 2025, while favorable perceptions of ***Latin American*** immigrants in particular increased by **22 points**.

Unfavorable views declined from 20% to 12%, indicating fewer Idahoans now hold negative perceptions of immigrants.



Attitudes Towards Immigration

Among Republicans, favorability towards immigrants overall increased by 11 percentage points.




Q2: What is your overall view of immigrants (people who come from other countries to live in the United States)?

Attitudes Towards Immigration

Favorability is lower for *undocumented immigrants* at 25%.

A quarter feel neutral, while 50% feel unfavorable.

This is compared to 59% that feel favorable towards immigrants in general, and Latin American immigrants.




Q9: What is your overall view of undocumented immigrants?

Attitudes Towards Immigration

More than half of respondents (56%) now say that immigrants make the country better in the long run, compared to 41% last year.

Meanwhile, the proportion who believe immigrants make society worse declined sharply, from 33% in 2024 to 16% in 2025.




Q5: Generally, how do you believe immigrants coming to the U.S. impact United States society overall?


Attitudes Towards Immigration

Republicans who believe immigrants make U.S. society worse overall dropped by **27 percentage points**, and the share that believe they make society better rose by **17**.



Drivers of Attitudes & Public Narrative

Support for making legal immigration easier increased by 16 percentage points.

At the same time, calls to make immigration harder declined significantly, from a combined 31% in 2024 to 21% in 2025.




Q6: In general, do you think it should be harder or easier for people to legally immigrate to the United States?

Drivers of Attitudes & Public Narrative

Conversations about immigration are dominated by fear-based narratives, centering on crime, stealing jobs, and using government resources.

A handful of respondents emphasized more positive or structural frames, including the economic contributions of immigrants (4%), agricultural dependence (5%), and calls for immigration process reform (2%).



Drivers of Attitudes & Public Narrative

In 2025, fewer respondents believe that immigration leads to more crime.


Perceptions linking immigration to higher crime rates have weakened noticeably over the past year. Nearly four in ten respondents (39%) now say immigration has no impact on crime, up nine points from 2024.

Fewer Republicans now believe that immigration increases crime. Those that believe it leads to more crime dropped by **22 points**.

Most respondents cite conversations about crime, jobs, and putting a strain on resources dominating the public narrative.

Discussions frame immigration through moral and legal lenses, who should leave, and who keeps Idaho's industries running.

Immigration Policy Attitudes


Respondents show mixed views on immigration enforcement policies, with strongest support for E-Verify requirements and strongest opposition to deploying the National Guard.

Requiring all Idaho employers to use the federal E-Verify system receives the most support, with 64% of respondents in favor.

44% favor local law enforcement cooperation with federal immigration authorities.

55% oppose deploying the National Guard to assist federal immigration authorities.

Q10: How much do you favor each of the following proposals regarding immigration?




Immigration Policy Attitudes

Respondents show strong, consistent support for inclusive immigration policies, with opposition remaining below 10% across all proposals.

Support is highest for expanding opportunities to work legally in the U.S., with 81% in favor and 8% opposed.

Across all three measures, opposition remains notably low, between 7% and 9%, suggesting broad agreement around these solutions.




Q11: How much do you favor each of the following proposals regarding immigration?

Immigration Policy Attitudes

Respondents majority support limiting public benefits and healthcare access for undocumented immigrants but reject more punitive self-deportation measures targeting work and education.



A majority of Idahoans favor limiting housing assistance (51%) and healthcare programs such as Medicaid or WIC (54%) for undocumented immigrants.

Immigration Policy Attitudes

Most respondents believe deportation should apply **only** to immigrants convicted of serious crimes and **should not** occur in sensitive locations like schools, churches, and hospitals.




Q12: Which statement comes closest to your view, even if neither is exactly right?

Immigration Policy Attitudes

A majority (52%) of respondents now agree that Idaho should invest more in programs that support immigrants, up from 42% last year.



Immigration Policy Attitudes

Respondents most often see immigration as an economic necessity, supporting agriculture, filling hard-to-staff jobs, and enriching culture, though some are concerned about strain on local resources and public safety.

Respondents emphasize immigrants' role in sustaining Idaho's industries, but some express concern about resource strain.
